Hawai'i's Endangered False Killer Whales

What we have learned from studies off Lāna'i and elsewhere in the main Hawaiian Islands

False killer whales around the main Hawaiian Islands were listed as Endangered under the Endangered Species Act in 2012. This population has been studied extensively since 1999, when studies began off of Maui and Lāna'i. Over the years it was discovered that the area to the southwest of Lāna'i is a hotspot for one of the four social clusters from this population, and Lāna'i-based research has been undertaken in a number of different years to better understand this population.
